

PRESIDENT'S REPORT AUGUST 2017

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The 2016-2017 was another milestone year for Women's Sledge Hockey of Canada. The year kicked off with a Paella Dinner Event in Edmonton to raise funds for the national team to travel to Norway – a great evening with family and friends supporting a good cause. Following this fundraiser, the national team was selected at tryouts in Montreal – our very first event in Quebec. We also held our AGM in Montreal the same weekend with over 50 people in attendance – what a privilege to have so many members from across the country all together in one place!

Going to Norway was so important for the international development of women's sledge hockey. In addition to competing in the Women's World Ice Sledge Hockey Festival, there were a series of very productive meetings with representatives from all of the nations. An outcome of these meetings was the development of an international committee dedicated to the growth of women's sledge hockey globally which has led to as stronger relationship with the International Paralympic Committee.

The rest of the season was all about making more connections in Canada with events in Manitoba, Nova Scotia, and Saskatchewan. It was exciting to go to new places, meet new people, and share our love of the game. We have now held events in all of the major regions across Canada!

The year ended in June with more exciting news – Women's Sledge Hockey of Canada met the requirements to become a Registered Canadian Amateur Athletic Association. This means that we can issue donation receipts and can access more potential grant funding – so important to the long term sustainability of our organization.

We are very fortunate to have so many dedicated players, coaches, volunteers and board members actively engaged to promote women's sledge hockey and grow the game. We truly are a TEAM and I feel so lucky to be a part of it.

To provide coaches and volunteers with education and training opportunities specific to females, disability and sport.


Ensure that females with disabilities have improved access to formal qualifications in sport.

WSHC hosts an open development camp in Regina, SK for over 30 participants traveling from AB, SK, MB, ON, and QC. The Regina Avengers join in for a friendly game during the final ice time.

JULY 22 - 23. 2017

Jessie Gregory hosts and coaches the first all female sledge goaltender development camp in Ontario. 3 female goaltenders attended and participated in 5 hrs of on-ice training and a 1 hour off ice workout.

APRIL 28 – 30, 2017

Raphaëlle Tousignant drops the puck for the National Development Team series at Defi Sportif Altergo.

MAY 12 - 14, 2017

Geneva Coulter, Alanna Mah and Derek Whitson win National Championships in Montreal, Quebec playing with Team Alberta. Peggy Assinck plays for Team BC which finishes 4th overall.

MAY 31, 2017

WSHC is officially informed that it has met the requirements to become an Registered Canadian Amateur Athletic Association! This status now allows us to issue donation tax receipts and opens up more grants and fundraising opportunities!

DEVELOPMENT

THE WSHC IMPACT

WSHC board members, coaches, volunteers, participants and national team players help to facilitate and support local programs and clubs across Canada. These programs run simultaneously across Canada.

WSHC promotes women's sledge hockey at tournaments hosted throughout Canada and supports the female athletes in attendance.

WSHC facilitates 'try sledge hockey' events and programs with our partners across Canada.

WSHC uses social media to create awareness about women's sledge hockey by featuring up and coming athletes and showcasing community based programs which are inclusive.

ROVINCIAL

WSHC facilitates the development of women's provincial sledge teams and programs.

WSHC hosts and supports provincial open development camps geared towards players of all ages, abilities and skill levels.

The Women's National Sledge Team plays predominately male provincial/all star teams in exhibition series which serves to promote the sport province-by-province.

National Team Training Camps and Exhibition Series include a community component where local players are invited to open practices with the national team coaches and athletes.

IATIONAL

WSHC hosts sledge hockey specific coaching courses and clinics in different provinces.

WSHC hosts Canadian Women's Sledge Hockey Championships (starting 2018).

WSHC strategically hosts national team training camps and exhibition series in different communities across Canada to promote women's sledge hockey and grow the sport.

WSHC helps facilitate female participation in the Canadian Sledge Hockey Championship (co-ed provincial teams with women participating in 3/6 co-ed provincial teams).

WSHC connects female athletes to local clubs/programs, supports local clubs to provide female inclusive programming.

WSHC collaborates with local organizations to create a coaching resource guide to support coaches across Canada.

DEVELOPMENT

2016/2017 SEASON EVENTS

MAY 20 - 21, 2017

REGINA DEVELOPMENT CAMP

This important female-centered sledge event provided opportunities for participation, skill development, volunteering, social and cultural development and most importantly, building understanding and creating awareness of an adapted sport and of the athletes. Participation was excellent for the event with 5 Provinces represented (AB, SK, MB, ON and QC) with the following breakdown (some participants had more than one role):

30 players

2 national

4 coaches

12 volunteers

This event generated the idea for a Facebook page dedicated to connect female para ice hockey players world wide to share and support each other.

MARCH 17 - 19, 2017

BC DEVELOPMENT CAMP

This event was the most successful sledge hockey development camp to date in the province of BC with over 56 players attending. Tara Chisholm led an NCCP Coach Level 1 & 2 Certification Course to train 18 new coaches. WSHC (represented by Tara Chisholm, Derek Whitson and Peggy Assisnck) also partnered with SportabilityBC to create an open source Para Ice Hockey Coaching Resource with funding support from ViaSport.

MARCH 10 - 12, 2017

NOVA SCOTIA COACHING CLINIC

WSHC hosted a coaching clinic, led by national team coaches Tara Chisholm and Derek Whitson, for 18 participants with a focus on sledge specific techniques and equipment fitting.

JULY 22 - 23, 2017

PORT COLBORNE GOALIE DEVELOPMENT CAMP

Jessie Gregory hosts and coaches the first all female goaltender development camp in Ontario. Three goaltenders attended and participated in 5 hrs of on-ice training and a 1 hour off ice workout. Three provinces were represented in this event: Quebec, Nova Scotia and Ontario.

While I had been a stand up goalie for a decade and now a sledge hockey goalie for the past 7 years, attending the Goalie camp put on by Jessie Gregory was an invaluable learning experience. Not only was it pretty cool to learn from the current number one goalie on Canada's national women's sledge hockey team, but to take shots from elite players (both current and former national men's team players as well as current members of the national women's team) who came and helped out over the weekend was awesome. We just don't have the opportunity to hone our skills with that calibre of players where I come from. We also don't have qualified goalie coaches to teach the basic goalie specific warm ups both off and on the ice.

The sledge movement in the crease, puck handling and rebound control drills were top notch and the best part was that they were all printed in handouts so I could take them home and continue to practice what I learned at the camp. I also very much appreciated the vast technical knowledge of the people helping with the camp as they helped me decide on certain adjustments I need to make to my sledge to help better my game.

PROVINCIAL

Canadian Women's Sledge Hockey Championship 2017

Women's Sledge Hockey of Canada (WSHC) in partnership with the Central York Girls Hockey Association (CYGHA) and Ontario Women's Hockey Association (OWHA) will be hosting the first ever Canadian Women's Sledge Hockey Championship November 17-19, 2017 at the Magna Centre in Newmarket, Ontario. Three teams have been confirmed to compete at this event – Team Ontario, Team Quebec and Team Alberta.

The proposed game format will be a double round robin with each team playing two games on Friday and Saturday and a gold medal game on Sunday. In addition, sledge try-it events will be held on Friday and Saturday for anyone wanting to come out and give sledge hockey a try.

Newmarket has hosted games series between Team Quebec and Team Ontario for the past 2 years at the Magna Centre. The games have run in conjunction with an annual girls hockey tournament and have always been a highlight of the tournament, bringing more awareness to sledge hockey and more specifically women's sledge hockey in Canada.







The future of women's sledge hockey is bright and to be on a squad that is laying the foundation for the future is an honour. Hands down my favourite part of any season is being able to travel the world while spreading the love of women's sledge hockey and it's potential.

SEASON OVERVIEW

NATIONAL TEAM

What a year this has been for the growth of women's sledge hockey across Canada and across the globe! The season started off with one the most competitive selection camps to date in Montreal, Quebec. The women selected to the 2016-2017 National team made history by being the first Canadian Women's National Sledge Hockey Team to travel outside of North America. After a quick training camp in Ontario, the team headed to Norway to play Team USA and Team Europe. The competition in Norway not only provided great opportunities for growth on the ice for all nations but an opportunity off the ice to start a deeper conversation with all teams on how to cohesively grow the women's game. These conversations helped to lead to the development of a women's section on the International Paralympic Committee Para Ice Hockey website. Women from all over the world could now see that female Para Ice Hockey exists.

Back in Canada, we were busy connecting with provinces across the nation to spread the message that women's sledge hockey is here to stay. Winnipeg welcomed us with open arms as we had a female only practice with local sledge players followed by one of our most well attended games ever against Team Manitoba. Team Canada then headed east to Halifax, Nova Scotia where again the hospitality was second to none. It was so exciting to see the passion in the Maritimes as we played their provincial team and also had a female only ice session.

Derek and I then headed west to connect with Sportability BC as they had plans for a project we were both very excited about. With the support of ViaSport, Derek and I assisted the Sportability BC team to create a Sledge Hockey Coach-

ing resource intended for grassroots level coaches. It is open source and includes skills, drills and accompanying videos. Shortly after that, we travelled to Regina, Sas-

katchewan to lead the first ever Women's Sledge Hockey of Canada camp in the province! We had girls and women join us from Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, Saskatchewan and Alberta! From this camp, was born an idea to start a social media page to connect all female sledge hockey players world wide! Now females across the world of any experience level can ask questions, share ideas and encourage one another to play the sport they all love.

Finally, Derek and I were asked to assist Great Britain to start their own female sledge hockey program. Women from all over Great Britain joined Team Europe for a weekend in Nottingham, England to learn the sport and train together. I was also able to run a full day coaching clinic for new and experienced sledge hockey coaches. It was a great opportunity for us to share our best practices with other nations while learning more about the successes and struggles that they have.

Looking back at what we have been able to accomplish this season makes me so proud. I feel fortunate to be able to connect with so many amazing people across Canada and the world. I cannot give enough credit to all of our players, staff, volunteers, members, board members, sponsors, partner organizations and all those in between for their dedication to women's sledge hockey.

The first time I ever sat in a sledge was around Christmas time '09. A good friend had invited my husband and I to spend the holidays in a tiny Ontario town, 3 hours north east of Toronto. Of course, this small town of 1000 year-round residents had an ice rink – a fact that boggled my Australian mind, having only recently immigrated from a country that can only boast 22 rinks (for a population of 22 million), 27th standing in women's stand-up hockey and, at the time, no Para Ice Hockey programs to speak of.

I was intrigued, excited to try something "Canadian" and "wintery", and loved that in this small town, just like in every community I've now played sledge in, the people were welcoming, encouraging and made a special point to ensure I was having fun. Before I knew it I'd been roped in to assisting with coaching learn-to play programs in Vancouver, volunteering as the manager for the Canadian Women's Sledge Hockey team since 2014, and now I play as a Scorpion with the Calgary Sledge Hockey Association and have recently been invited to join the board.

All this time I couldn't say no to being a part of a sport that provides so many people with a positive, inclusive team experience, no matter your ability. I'm regularly staggered when I talk with parents who can now say "12 months ago I never thought I'd be able to play a sport with my child"; or when I see an athlete, young or old, find a place where they feel comfortable to play, excel or to just be with friends.

I'm glad for the time I have invested in sledge hockey since 2009 as I have been able to bring lessons I've learned about adaptive programming in to my day job as a Phys. Ed. teacher for students with diverse needs; I've been able to travel all around Canada and increasingly around the world to support our women's team; and I am honoured to have met so many incredible female athletes, coaches and supporters who I can count among my closest friends.

To all the people who make this game great, keep up the good work.

COACHING DEVELOPMENT

WSHC believes that building sledge hockey leadership across Canada is very important so that we can provide coaches and volunteers with education and training opportunities specific to women, disability and sport. Our national team coaching staff are well known throughout Canada as they are highly involved in the development of sledge hockey and are always working to provide inclusive programming for girls and women in the sport of sledge hockey. Tara Chisholm (Head Coach of the Women's National Team) is a certified Hockey Canada NCCP Coach Level 2 facilitator and this has allowed WSHC to host several NCCP sledge hockey specific coaching courses around Canada. In addition, WSHC has hosted several coaching clinics facilitated by our national team coaches.

Tara worked with Hockey Alberta and Hockey Canada to develop sledge specific content for the Level 1 & 2 NCCP coaching course. This course has been a huge success and is now in high demand across Canada. It emphasizes basic skills and the importance of having players develop confidence, self-esteem and a love for the game. WSHC has facilitated several NCCP coaching courses in different provinces and worked with local hosts to support high ratios of female participants and used the opportunity to help empower participants to help make their clubs/programs more inclusive to female athletes.

Surrey, BC: March 17th -18th, 2017. Facilitated in partnership with BC Hockey and SportAbility. 18 coaches certified including 7 women.

WSHC has also hosted sledge hockey specific coaching clinics with local communities and plan to host more moving forward. These clinics are perfect for new coaches and facilitators to learn the basics of sledge hockey, sledge hockey equipment, planning a practice, adapting your practice depending on your athlete group, etc.

Sledge Hockey (Para Ice Hockey) Coaching Resource: A Guide to Inclusive Programing.

This 65-page PDF resource was developed in partnership with several organizations in British Columbia with the goal of publishing an open source resource for sledge hockey coaches/facilitators/programmers across Canada. The resource includes an introduction section overviewing sledge hockey, equipment, and how to facilitate differentiated programing. It then includes a section on individual skills (with accompanying videos for each skill) and a section with 26 group drills and games (with associated demonstration video) that can be used in grassroots and development sledge hockey programing across Canada. The document was written by the coaches of our national team (Tara Chisholm and Derek Whitson) and WSHC board member and national team athlete, Peggy Assinck in conjunction with SportAbility British Columbia.
